Dear Friends,

Life is full of ups and downs - no one said it was going to be easy – and so when the news gets too hard to bear, as Christians we do have the hope and encouragement offered through the experience of other Christians, who have been through hardship and difficult times and know exactly what suffering is, and how it can be conquered in the light of Jesus Christ. Read Romans 8: verses 28 to 39, and if the last two verses do not give you hope or strength or comfort then you certainly do need our Alpha course!! Yes, we are having a Wigan Wide Alpha Course to be run



at separate venues, some daytime and others in the evening, launch date 25th September, 2017. Alpha is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. Alpha will be run all around Wigan, and everyone's welcome. No two Alphas will be the same, but generally they have three key things in common: food, a talk and good conversation. Even now, meetings have been taking place to encourage a variety of groups to take part in Alpha, such as a Special Needs Alpha, and Mother's and Toddler's Alpha, a Youth Alpha, and there was mention of a Craft Alpha! More precise details will be given on the Church Notice sheet.

Most sessions start with food because it's a great way to build community and get to know each other followed by a talk. The talks are designed to engage and inspire conversation. Usually around thirty minutes long and delivered over about eleven weeks, they can be given as a live talk or played as a video. They explore the big issues around faith and unpack the basics of Christianity, addressing questions from *Who is Jesus*? and *How can we have faith?* to *Why and how do I pray?* and *How does God guide us?*

This is followed by discussion. Probably the most important part of any Alpha: the chance to share thoughts and ideas on the topic, and simply to discuss it in a small group. There's no obligation to say anything and there's nothing you can't say (seriously). It's an opportunity to hear from others and contribute your own perspective in an honest, friendly and open environment.

- St. Matthew's Parish Hall, on Monday evenings, commencing 25th September, 2017 more details to follow. Our main purpose now is to encourage as many people to take part in Alpha as possible. We believe that everyone should have the chance to explore the Christian faith, ask questions and share their point of view. Alpha offers the opportunity to do just that in an informal, friendly and open environment. No one can force anyone to believe anything, but we've found over the years that if we're hospitable and just let guests be themselves, lives will be transformed.

So be bold and mention it to your neighbours and friends, to your family and nearest and dearest. Arrange to meet them outside the venue, so they feel more at ease as they come through the door. Remember that the first step is the hardest, but once that step is taken they and you will have the opportunity to ask the big questions, to talk and find the answers that will change their lives and yours. We will need volunteers to help run the Alpha Courses, from Hosts, Small Group Leaders, Prayer Teams, Kitchen Teams, 'Set up and Set Down Teams', so if this is something you feel called to do, then please speak to me, or Neil, Christiane or Cliff Unsworth. The Transfiguration: The story of the Transfiguration is told in Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:1-9) and Luke (9:28-36). HEALING HANDS

In 1962, Mamitu Gashe suffered horrendous injuries during childbirth. But she went on to dedicate her life to saving women in Ethiopia who have been through the same experience. Jane Yettram reports

aving been married at just 14, Mamitu was 16 years old when she went into labour with her first child. But the baby wouldn't come. After four days, Mamitu fell into unconsciousness. Her baby was stillborn – and Mamitu herself was left with holes torn between her rectum, bladder and birth canal, leaving faeces and urine trickling unstoppably from her vagina.

'I imagined I would heal within a few days,' she says. But she didn't.

For three weeks Mamitu lay in a hut, in pain and distress, until her family carried her the many miles from her remote village to Ethiopia's capital, Addis Ababa. Luckily, she

reached the Princess Tsehai Hospital. Because there she came across Australian gynaecologists Reginald and Catherine Hamlin, who operated on her injuries – and gave her a future full of love and support, as well as the opportunity to help others like her.



Mamitu's obstructed labour – common in undernourished young girls with underdeveloped pelvises – had caused her injuries, known as an obstetric fistula. This still occurs frequently in developing countries, including Ethiopia, where 85% of births are unattended by a doctor or midwife, 25% of women die from pregnancy-related complications, and eight per cent die from an obstructed labour like Mamitu's.

In developed countries like the UK, the latest medical facilities are on hand to deliver babies and prevent fistulas when mothers face complications. But in Ethiopia, lack of medical care and facilities, as well as the mountainous and inaccessible terrain (75% of the population live, on average, two and a half days' walk from an all-weather road), lead to such devastating outcomes.

Untreated, obstetric fistulas often leave a woman doubly incontinent – leaking waste that causes agonising sores on her skin and a constant appalling smell. And she may well be abandoned, made an outcast or banished to a distant hut because of the stench. The World Health Organization estimates



that more than two million young women live with untreated obstetric fistula in Asia and sub-Saharan Africa. But Dr Catherine Hamlin, and her husband, Dr Reg, who died in 1993, dedicated their lives to treating these women – as has Mamitu herself.

CHANGING LIVES

Surgery can repair the damage to 80-95% of fistulas patients, with most out of bed within a few days and discharged within a couple of weeks. Sadly, Mamitu's injuries were so bad that she was never fully cured, despite many operations. But, back in the 1960s, Dr Catherine and Dr Reg saw immense potential in this young girl who had never been to school and

could neither read nor write. So when they opened their own fistula hospital dedicated to treating women for free, Mamitu was given a job as a nurse aide making beds. She then began helping out during surgeries and, after a couple of years of watching, she was asked by Dr Reg to cut some stitches. Soon, Mamitu started to perform fistula repair and – after carrying out more than 1,000 operations – became one of the world's most experienced fistula surgeons, training gynaecologists from around the world. In 1989, she, Dr Catherine and Dr Reg were all awarded the Gold Medal of the Royal College of Surgeons of Great Britain.

The fistula hospital gave Mamitu a home, a family, a future and the skills to change others' lives. And it has done the same for other women, with 150 fistula patients with ongoing care needs being trained as nurse aides, often by Mamitu, empowering them to give the love and empathy that patients – mainly poor, malnourished, frightened and a long way from their families – need.

Of course, the best way of all to wipe out obstetric fistula is to give women good healthcare, including during pregnancy and labour. And, over the decades, Hamlin Fistula's work has expanded to do just that. Five regional hospitals have been set up across Ethiopia – including, for example, in Bahir Dar, an area of the country where girls are often married as young as seven or eight – with the ability to perform caesarean sections in difficult labours as well as do fistula repair. Each also has a network

of local clinics, staffed by graduates of Hamlin Fistula's own midwifery college, which was set up to train midwives to provide antenatal and delivery care.

WORLD-CLASS SURGEON

Mamitu, now 71, has recently retired, but she still lives in the hospital grounds in a tukul, a traditional rondavel-style house. And she is respected by all. In 2009, she was honoured with an award from the Society of Ethiopians Established in Diaspora. It said, 'The society salutes Mamitu as one of the world's premier obstetric fistula surgeons who, despite never having been to medical school and having endured a fistula herself, has enabled countless fellow Ethiopians to live a healthier and longer life.'

In 2014, Dr Catherine celebrated her 90th birthday. At the festivities she called for work to continue to eradicate fistulas completely in Ethiopia, and her son, Richard, stated that his mother 'has one son and 35,000 daughters', summing up Dr Catherine's love and compassion for those she has helped. One of those daughters is Mamitu – who has also dedicated her own life to helping fistula patients. 'She is a very special person who is looked up to and is loved by everyone,' says Dr Catherine. 'She is like the daughter I never had. She is a treasure indeed!'

Sharp increase in numbers training to be priests

A 14% increase in numbers training for the priest-hood has been welcomed by the Church of England. An anticipated total of 543 men and women will begin studies this Autumn at colleges across England.

Welcoming the increase, the Bishop of Guildford, Andrew Watson, said:

"I am delighted at both the number and the range of those whom God has been calling into ordained ministry over the course of the past year. Here are men and women who are choosing to put their faith on the line, so as to bring hope and spiritual nourishment to individuals and communities alike. In an increasingly uncertain world, nothing could be a greater privilege than walking alongside people in their joys and sorrows, from birth to grave."

An increase of 17% in women coming forward for ordination was welcomed by Catherine Nancekievill, Head of Vocation for the Church of England:

"The Church's aim is to reflect our diversity in the priesthood and whilst we have a long way to go in achieving this, I am delighted that increasing numbers of women now feel that a life in ordained ministry is for them. This is a big step in breaking down the stereotypes, which is crucial in order to attract underrepresented groups."

The figures show that 25% of the cohort beginning training this year are under 32. The increasing age profile of clergy has been a significant motivator for the Church in focusing on growing ordained vocations. Catherine Nancekievill said:

"The Church takes seriously the signs that God is calling Millennials to consider careers that offer the opportunity to work for the common good. We now have an officer working to raise awareness of what training for ministry can offer to young people. Our popular scheme which offers on the job ministry experience is to undergo substantial

growth this year."


Commenting on the support of Allchurches

Trust for the ministry experience scheme, Chairman, Sir Philip Mawer, said:

"Young people are known to care deeply about finding a role in which they can help make the world a better place and for an increasing number that means going into ministry. We look for-

ward to working with the Church as they develop the Ministry Experience Scheme to offer a path to lay or ordained ministry for a greater number and ever wider range of people."

This increase in people coming forward for ministry training comes after the launch in 2015 of Renewal and Reform, a body of work which aims to breathe new life into the Church through growing lay and ordained vocations, increasing flexibility in funding and reducing red tape to enable local churches better to serve their communities.

After the General Election: a still small voice of calm

The Church of England is providing a "still small voice of calm" at a time when the people of Britain face "unprecedented questions about the future", according to the Archbishops of Canterbury and York.

The recent General Election has left many questions unanswered at a "critical time in the nation's history," and Christians should therefore pray for political leaders to have courage but also give thanks for signs of political apathy receding, they say.


The call came in the text of a motion debated at the Church's General Synod, which met in York in July. The archbishops used their legal powers to change the published schedule to include an urgent debate on the state of the nation.

Entitled 'After the General Election: a still small voice of calm,' it took place on the opening afternoon of Synod, Friday July 7.

Also before General Synod was a paper setting out the process for compiling a major new teaching document on human sexuality, and the work of a new Pastoral Advisory Group to advise dioceses on pastoral provision for same-sex couples. It follows a vote in February in which Synod opted not to 'take note' of the House of Bishops' report on sexuality.


The paper, also issued by the two archbishops, reiterates a pledge to base the new teaching document on a "radical Christian inclusion" to be "founded in scripture, in reason, in tradition, in theology and the Christian faith as the Church of England has received it."


