#### 2 Timothy 2: 1-10 -'Leaving a Good Legacy'

"As for you, my son, be strong through the grace that is ours in union with Christ Jesus. Take the teachings that you heard me proclaim in the presence of many witnesses, and entrust them to reliable people, who will be able to teach others also." – 1 Tim. 2:1-2

At various times in life, we think about the legacy we want to leave behind us. Perhaps the most profound time for thinking about this is as we get older, and we look back and reflect on the impact we have made in the world, and we look forward to the time that we have left to us, and we think through what we might do, what we might want to achieve so that our legacy is a good one.

Sometimes, we might think about the legacy we are leaving at the stage we call 'mid-life'. There might still be time to change a career, take up new hobbies, change our old pattern of behaviour for new. The 'mid-life' crisis is not necessarily a negative thing in that it helps us to reflect and make good decisions about the legacy we will leave. Perhaps we may think about the legacy we will leave when we are changing jobs, or changing the location in which we live, we move on – we want to have made a difference.

But also we should be thinking about the legacy that we will leave in every social interaction in which we engage through the week. Every time we talk with someone, or email them, or phone them, we are leaving a legacy, an impact on their lives – for good or for bad.

What legacy do you want to leave, when you die, when you reflect on your life and on a daily basis?

A wasted life – or a life full of wasted opportunities is not what we want, is it?

For some people the announcement that our Hub Leader, Revd. Neil Cook is moving on has come as a disappointment, we are sad at his going, but I am glad to say that Revd. Neil is not going very far, in fact, we are pleased to say that he is remaining in Church Wigan, in a new role as Team Rector for Church Wigan. Neil with the assistance of Mark, our curate has been looking after three large churches, and has been responsible for steering these Churches through considerable change, but as he looks back at his time with us, he can be proud of what he, along with his wife Christiane, Mark and Toni have achieved here in St. Paul's, St. James with St. Thomas and with St. Matthews. They have all had, and will continue to have, considerable impact on our lives and the lives of others.

That is exactly what Paul was thinking about when he wrote this letter to Timothy. Paul was nearing the end of his life; he was under house arrest by the Romans and he was facing execution by beheading. No doubt Paul had plenty of time to look back over his life and consider all that he had achieved for God, and his chief concern was to establish a church that would continue to thrive and grow long after he had died. So now Paul is writing to Timothy to encourage him to keep strong in the faith after Paul, his mentor, has died.

I urge you to read 2 Timothy for yourselves, for it is a beautiful letter, full of encouragement, and there is a lovely closing statement from Paul in 4:6 "The time is here for me to leave this life. I have done my best in the race, I have run the full distance, and I have kept the faith. And now there is waiting for me the victory prize of being put right with God, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me, but all those who wait with love for him to appear." So how can we leave a good legacy through our lives and in our daily interactions? How can we make a positive difference in the world? Firstly, by showing 'Grace' towards others. Grace is common to all of us as Christians because it has to do with showing kindness and compassion towards others because that is what we have first received from God. Secondly, consider the impact that your 'Words' have on others. In verse 2 of this passage, Paul writes, "The things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses, entrust those things to reliable men and women who will also be qualified to teach others." How we use words is very important: once something has been said, it cannot be unsaid; the legacy has been created. We need to think very carefully before we speak. Thirdly, stay 'Focused' on your task in life. Staying focused is extremely hard in a world of global internet and social media, but it is the key to leaving a good legacy: decide what is important in life, focus on it, and work on it with all your being. And of course nothing is more important, nothing requires greater focus, than our relationship with God. Our careers end when we retire, but our relationship with God is eternal. And lastly, consider the need for 'Wisdom'. Wisdom is so often overlooked, ruled over by 'knowledge'. But wisdom is not the same thing as knowledge. Wisdom is the ability to know what to do with the knowledge you have. There are a lot of world leaders who have plenty of knowledge but completely lacking in wisdom. They misuse the knowledge they

have, with terrible consequences for us all. A wise person does not always act on their knowledge. A wise person does not always speak. A wise person knows when to speak and when to remain silent.

In these four ways, we will create a legacy that will have a hugely positive impact on others, a legacy that will outlive us all. We can make a difference in the world. We can leave a wonderful legacy. So let's be careful of what we say and how we act so that we can shape the world to be a better place.

We wish Neil and his family a happy and exciting future as he takes up the challenges of his new role, with Grace, with Words of encouragement, with Focus, and with Wisdom.

## Best way to enjoy the Bible? Be like a dog with a bone!

Sarah brought her beautiful dog Bobby to a Quiet Morning at church. He was very well behaved and loved all the attention he received. As we began our time together Sarah gave him a bone to chew on, and he settled down contentedly, enjoying his own experience of 'heaven'!

The expression came into my mind, 'like a dog with a bone', and watching



Bobby at work further confirmed my thinking. Here before us was a wonderful example of what it means to meditate on Scripture – to slowly and patiently chew things over in our mind until we begin to grasp internally what God is saying to us.

The Bible encourages us to meditate in this way. Think of Psalm 1,

where we read about the godly person 'whose delight is in the law of the Lord and who meditates on His law, day and night (V2).' Think also of Joshua who was told, 'Keep this book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it (Joshua 1:8). Mary did this as well, when at the birth of Jesus she 'treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart (Luke 2:19).'

Perhaps sometimes we don't spend enough time with Scripture, letting its truth soak into our minds and pondering its meaning and application to our lives. The spiritual discipline of Bible meditation helps us to do just that. Why not take a verse of Scripture that has caught your attention recently, and chew it over as you go through the day, looking at it this way and that way until you feel you have received the goodness it contains?



#### Get in step with God

We are in a year of new beginnings. We have the start of another triennium, many new officers appointed and constitution and structures updated. This year also sees the coming together of our global conversations to prayerfully inform our way forward.

As we gain clarity about our God-given purpose and direction both local and global context, we will be energised and inspired to make a difference. Our annual theme has been chosen to reflect this and give us tools to help us continue to listen and observe in order to act with insight and integrity; neither running ahead nor lagging behind, but always in step with God. In the Bible we find many examples of Jesus observing those he encountered. This always led him to take action for their good. He reached out to the poor and vulnerable, and his motivation was love and compassion rather than duty.

Jesus listened to the leper and acted with compassion. He observed the hungry and harassed crowds and acted with compassion. There are times when he addressed a different need to the most obvious one. His response to the paralysed man was initially to forgive his sins and only secondly to effect physical healing. Christ's compassion must have played a significant part in discerning the deeper needs. Mothers' Union members across the world are also acting with compassion as we listen to the vulnerable around us. One of the groups identified through the MULOA process has been labelled the screaming silent.

These may be the people where all seems well on the surface-but inside they are crying out for help. It takes a deeper level of listening to hear them and take action.

The scale of need calls for an endless supply of this Christ like quality. So its good to remember the more we draw near and spend time in Christ's presence, the more we become like him and are able to reflect his love.

# All things come from You, and of Your own do we ... not give back much!

Jesus taught a great deal about money and its dangers. Most of His parables concerned money in one form or another. He used the word 'Mammon' to describe a false financial god, saying "You can't serve God and Mammon."

So, a right attitude to money is essential for Christians.

Until we are released from the straitjacket of putting money before God, that blocked soul-artery will impede our way to God.

Once we are liberated from the control money has over us, we can be lavish in our giving – with a sense of exuberance. St Paul puts it like this: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

St Paul spent ten years raising funds for the impoverished Church in Jerusalem where there was a serious famine. The little and very poor Church in Macedonia gave way beyond their comfort zone. The relatively wealthy Church in Corinth gave little by comparison. Paul contrasts them. Miserable Corinthians; joyful Macedonians.



Giving is fun.

Christian giving becomes something that we share privately with Jesus. In Matthew Jesus taught that when we give, we should not let even our left hand know what our right hand is doing.

God is generous to us, so when we are generous, we share a secret with Him. "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you by His poverty might become rich."

So - giving money away makes you happy!

Giving to God is giving back what He has already given to us. It's not the quantity, it's the percentage of what we have. A right attitude to money is vital for Christians.



# A group of Church of England bishops has issued an open letter on the prospect of a 'no-deal' Brexit and the need for national reconciliation, notwithstanding the potential prorogation of Parliament. The full text is as follows:

The Archbishop of Canterbury has conditionally agreed to chair a Citizens Forum in Coventry and, without prejudice for any particular outcome, we support this move to have all voices in the current Brexit debate heard.

However, we also have particular concerns about the potential cost of a No Deal Brexit to those least resilient to economic shocks.

As bishops with pastoral responsibilities in communities across urban and rural England, we respond to the call by Jesus to tell the truth and defend the poor. We also recognise that our obligations go beyond England and impact on relations with the wider UK and our neighbours in the EU.

Exiting the EU without an agreement is likely to have a massive impact on all our people and the Government is rightly preparing for this outcome. The Government believes that leaving the EU on 31 October is essential to restoring trust and confidence.

It is unlikely, however, that leaving without an agreement, regardless of consequences, will lead to reconciliation or peace in a fractured country. "Getting Brexit done" will not happen on exit day, and we have to be transparent about the years of work ahead of us in bringing the country together for a better future. We also need to be frank about the potential costs.

# Bishops Issue on B



Our main social and political priority must be to leave well, paying particular attention to the impact of political decisions on those most vulnerable.

We hold different views about Brexit and how our country should proceed from here. However, although we agree that respecting a public vote is essential, democracy and committed debate do not end after the counting of votes. Our concern for the common good leads us to express concern about a number of matters. Our conviction is that good governance can only ever be based on the confidence of the governed, and that includes minorities whose voice is not as loud as others.

## e open Letter rexit



Seeing the evidence of division in every part of England, we are deeply concerned about:

Political polarisation and language that appears to sanction hate crime: the reframing of the language of political discourse is urgent, especially given the abuse and threats levelled at MPs doing their job.

The ease with which lies can be told and misrepresentation encouraged: leaders must be honest about the costs of political choices, especially for those most vulnerable. The levels of fear, uncertainty and marginalisation in society, much of which lies behind the vote for Brexit, but will not be addressed by Brexit: poor people, EU citizens in the UK and UK citizens in Europe must be listened to and respected.

The Irish border is not a mere political totem and peace in Ireland is not a ball to be kicked by the English: respect for the concerns on both sides of the border is essential.

The sovereignty of Parliament is not just an empty term, it is based on institutions to be honoured and respected: our democracy is endangered by cavalier disregard for these.

Attention must be paid not only to the Union, but also to the meaning of Englishness.

Churches serve communities of every shape, size and complexion. We continue to serve, regardless of political persuasion. We invite politicians to pay attention with us to the concerns we register above and encourage a recovery of civil debate and reconciliation.

### **Flyers Overhead**

There are up to 10,000 different kinds of birds in the world, and with about 530 different kinds in Israel alone, no wonder birds get a frequent mention in the Bible.

Noah released a dove from the ark to look for dry ground. A stork, an ostrich and an eagle are mentioned in Job. Quails were food for the Israelites in the desert. Elijah was fed by ravens. Proverbs refers to sparrows chirping on rooftops. Peter denied Jesus before the cock crowed.


A dove descending is a symbol of the Holy Spirit. The flight of the eagle reminds us of freedom and the renewal of strength. The psalmist uses wings as a symbol for the protection of God in times of trouble. Isaiah likens a bird hovering over its nest, to protect its young, to describe God's




protection of Jerusalem. Jesus yearned to gather the people of Jerusalem to Him as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings.

Jesus also compared us with sparrows: "For only a penny you can buy two sparrows, yet not one sparrow falls to the ground without your Father's consent...so do not be afraid; you are worth much more than many sparrows!" (Matt 10:29-30)

For Jesus encourages us to know that each one of us is significant to God. He knows us personally, and, in His sight, we are precious and of great value. Let's raise our eyes heavenward and when we see all the birds flying overhead this autumn, let's give thanks to God. Like them, we can be confident, for we are always in His loving care.


