Children and young people provision on Sundays and in the week

One of the things that we are excited about is being able to welcome our families back and offering Sunday provision in a number of different ways.

Children of all ages are welcome at any of our services and our hope is that they will be able to engage either with the service or with the groups provided for them.



St Pauls: We shall be starting junior church for 4-13 year olds, activities for toddlers, and space for babies. Our teenagers are invited to come in and help.

This will happen every 2nd, 3rd and 4th Sunday of each month. The first Sunday of each month will be an all-age baptism service. We are working out whether the best and safest place to offer this is at St Paul's Church or St Paul's Hall.

St Matthews: Every 2^{nd} Sunday of each month will be an all-age service where children and young people will help lead the service. The 1^{st} , 3^{rd} and 4^{th} Sunday of each month at both the 9am and 10.30am services there will be a space to explore the readings with activity sheets and toys at the back of church. We are looking at what provision we can offer on Sundays in the coming year.

St James: The 2^{nd} Sunday of each month will be a all-age baptism service. We shall have Junior Church held in the glass room at church every 1^{st} , 3^{rd} and 4^{th} Sunday of each month.

Young People: We have a number of different ways for our young people meet each week for 11-18 year-olds. For more information please contact Christine Cook on 07766 711099.

It was quite exciting to experience riding on a steam train again for the first time in many years and we were thoroughly enjoying the trip. Our lunch of Aberdeen Angus sausages with garlic mash was served very efficiently along with a welcome glass of wine. We finished with Lancashire tart and cream having very much enjoyed the meal. All too soon two and a half hours had passed and we arrived back at our departure point. The coach trip home was uneventful and we arrived back at approximately 5.30pm, feeling refreshed and wondering where our next trip will take us. Where your treasure is ...

This is the eleventh article in the series that I have been writing for this magazine. In the first ten, I have explored some of the basics of the Christian faith. You might think that this piece is different, because I am going to talk about money, and you might think that this topic is just about practicalities, not about the central issues of the faith. I don't think that is true. Read the gospels, and you will find that Jesus has a lot to say about money.

The last part of a man to be converted is his wallet. Attributed to John Wesley

In the Acts of the Apostles we read that the early church in Jerusalem shared all their

worldly goods: "All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need." (Acts 2, 44-45.) It has to be admitted that, a few years later, the Apostle Paul was busy collecting money from the gentile churches, who hadn't adopted such a radical policy, to give to the impoverished Jerusalem church.

Yet Paul didn't consider his efforts to collect money as something separate from his ministry as an



Apostle – indeed, he was willing to risk upsetting the churches he wrote to, in order to press the case for aiding poor fellow believers.

In the Old Testament, the priests were supported by a tithe – a tenth of all wealth and produce was reserved for the Temple, and paying that tenth was an essential part of being a devout Jew. Some churches still teach tithing as a fixed duty, with each member expected to give a tenth of their income to the church, and those churches never need to have jumble sales or fix huge cardboard thermometers outside their buildings. But, although the example of tithing is a wholesome one, no such rule, as a fixed rule, can be found in the New Testament. So what does the New Testament say?

Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. Matthew 6:21

Jesus warned very clearly about the dangers of being ruled by money. Indeed, he said that it was impossible to serve God and wealth. Giving to the church is only one aspect of our stewardship of all that we have. The institution of the church is not identical to God's kingdom. But if we believe that the church is, however imperfectly, cooperating with God in his mission in our world, then surely we must wish to see it prosper. We don't want it to be running on petrol fumes all the time, having to worry about the accounts when we should be sharing the good news of Jesus.

There is no point in playing at being poor for an hour each Sunday morning. If many of us live in comfort the rest of the week, then should we really run our common life on a shoestring? This parish is doing amazing work amongst those in need, and connecting with people, even during lockdown, who have never encountered the gospel before.

Take my silver and my gold, not a mite would I withhold. Frances Ridley Havergal

All this marvellous work, all these God-given opportunities will wither on the vine if we are held back by lack of income.

Perhaps you have already thought and prayed about the financial contribution you can make to this parish. In that case, thank you. But the days when churches could live off the gifts given by the Christians in the churchyard have gone. The breathing Christians are going to have to pay their own way now.

God has given us his greatest gift in sending his Son to be our Saviour. We respond with the joyful gift of ourselves, and that includes thinking about our financial priorities. Please pray about this.

When people talk about "sacrificial giving" it makes it all sound very grim and sombre. But remember what the book of Psalms says about the sacrifices in the Temple. The people were not reluctant to make sacrifices – the festivals were the occasion of joy and celebration. To contribute to God's mission is a joy and a privilege.
